Then our Research Volunteer role is for you! Our Research Volunteers support our Heritage Team to uncover the fascinating histories of New Lanark's people, practices and collections. Research Volunteers work with our collections and reference library to research a variety of diverse topics relating to New Lanark's local and international history and heritage. Our Research Volunteers are integral to our evolving understanding of New Lanark's history and the continued development of talks, tours, exhibitions and learning resources.

Research Volunteers will have the chance to gain skills in historical research, collection interpretation and exhibition curation. New Lanark is a UNESCO World Heritage Site of international significance. By sharing New Lanark's rich and varied history with our visitors, volunteers are contributing to the site's longevity, allowing it to be preserved for future generations.

What will you be doing?

- Researching New Lanark's history using our CMS eHive, our physical and digital collections and reference library
- · Researching and analysing reputable historical sources through online databases and catalogues
- Working collaboratively with other Research Volunteers and the Heritage Team
- Creating and maintaining accurate and coherent reports of research topics
- Supporting the development of talks, tours, exhibitions and learning resources
- Answering basic research enquiries from the public, schools and universities.

Ongoing support, training and skills development will be provided for these duties.

What skills might you need?

- A keen interest in history, heritage and material culture
- Strong attention to detail and excellent written skills
- · Ability to analyse historical material and sources
- Understanding of online catalogues and databases for research (e.g National Records, Google Scholar and genealogy databases)
- A collaborative mindset



What skills can you develop through this role?

- · Experience of working in the heritage industry
- · Experience of working with the collections of a World Heritage Site of international interest
- Experience of researching history using digital and material sources
- Experience of Family History enquiries and key genealogy databases
- Experience of working with CMS databases
- Experience of exhibition curation and development
- Knowledge of New Lanark, its history, and present day vision

Time Commitment

- Year round and flexible
- Estimated 4 hours per week, however we are able to allow a degree of flexibility

Requirements
